


## Between the Alps, the Dolomites and the Adriatic Sea A concentrate of Italy





# A sea of wellness for the whole family

A unique coastline that concentrates diverse landscapes across 130 kilometres and delivers experiences for all sea lovers. From the beaches of Lignano Sabbiadoro, enjoying sports, entertainment and relaxation, cross the lagoons of Marano and Grado to the Island of the Sun, Grado, with its south-facing sandy shores and rich history, and to the rocky coves, where white cliffs and the fascinating Karst are reflected in the deep blue of the Adriatic Sea for breathtaking views of the Gulf of Trieste, the most eastern in the Mediterranean Sea.

#### **Lignano Sabbiadoro**

A long, golden peninsula is the calling card of Lignano Sabbiadoro, one of the most renowned seaside resorts in Italy, which recently celebrated its 120th anniversary. Its eight-kilometre beach is not its only distinctive feature: Lignano Sabbiadoro boasts an immense pine forest of over 1,200,000 trees which has won it the prestigious "Tree Cities of the World" award from FAO and the Arbor Day Foundation.

Surrounded by three bodies of water, the crystal-clear Tagliamento River, the brackish waters of the Lagoon of Marano, and the extremely clean Adriatic Sea, which has traditionally been awarded the Blue Flag, Lignano Sabbiadoro is the ideal destination to unwind and recharge your batteries by enjoying many experiences in close contact with nature. Care for the environment, the focus on well-being and the vocation for the sustainability of this area are also reflected in the range of opportunities for outdoor activities, such as water sports, cycling and hiking, where people can connect with the surrounding territory and its nature reserves.

#### Grado

Popularly known as the "Island of the Sun" with its many kilometres of sandy beaches facing south, Grado is the record-breaking Blue Flag beach, but also one of the most romantic locations in Friuli Venezia Giulia. Embraced by the lagoon, which creates a magical setting around the island, it is also rich in history with a hamlet that recalls Venetian architecture. Founded in the Roman era as a trading port of Aquileia, its centre is a labyrinth of narrow alleys and small squares overlooked by picturesque fishermen's houses. An ideal destination for families and travellers not only interested in the sea but also in culture and history, it offers wellness areas to treat body care enthusiasts and a choice of several bathing facilities with the option of practising sports in the water or on the shore. The thermal baths were built in the Austro-Hungarian period and are currently undergoing a major renovation project. Elegant and refined, it features a lively and deep-rooted tradition as well as the best of local food and wine, with dishes specially made with fresh fish.

#### Top 5

- The award-winning Alpe Adria Cycle Track, from Salzburg to Grado (FVG1)
- The many islands of the Lagoon can be reached by boat, such as the island of Barbana, which houses the Benedictine sanctuary, the beginning of the Celestial Way, or the island of Mota Safon featuring Pasolini's "casone," or the nature reserves where pink flamingos and Camargue horses can be admired
- The historic centre with early Christian basilicas, the remains of an ancient cathedral, the port of Mandracchio and craft workshops.
- Typical recipes: Boreto alla Graisana or Santonego
- Grado is an important kite spot for wind sports enthusiasts where they find the perfect conditions for safe wave riding

#### The Gulf of Trieste

The coastline and Trieste, a city of sun, wind and sea, animate the Gulf, providing fun and relaxation. An irresistible attraction between rocks and waves that starts from the beach of Marina Julia (Monfalcone), crosses Duino-Aurisina, the Gulf of Sistiana, the coast of Trieste and reaches Muggia, one of the most picturesque seaside villages of the Region.

#### Top 5

- The Lanterna "Pedocin" the only beach in Europe that still maintains a strict separation between men and women by means of a wall. A wall that, in a city that has always welcomed and respected the diversity of languages, cultures and religions, is a symbol of freedom and certainly not of bigotry. "In the Pedocin, you are actually more free to do what you want without upsetting anyone", is what people say in Trieste.
- Water and wind sports the wind spot of Marina Julia and the sailing tradition
- · The seaside castles of Duino and Miramare
- The maritime villages of **Duino** and **Muggia** in the Gulf of Trieste
- A paradise for outdoor sports enthusiasts with climbing on the cliffs by the sea, snorkelling in the Miramare Marine Protected Area and trekking routes on the Karst
- Two nature reserves (the Duino Cliffed Coast and the Miramare Biosphere and Marine Reserve) and one of the deepest caves in Europe: the "Grotta Gigante" (the Giant Cave)

#### La laguna

The lagoon of Friuli Venezia Giulia is an enchanted location between the sea and the mainland featuring islets, salt marshes, and fishing valleys to be explored by boat or in a canoe. Marano Lagunare and Grado, with their canals and traditional "casoni" - the ancient fishermen's dwellings built with materials from the lagoon - provide an excellent location for birdwatching.







### On the taste routes

Authentic flavours and aromas in a journey of taste from the Alps to the sea, through the rolling hills and the vast plains.

There is not one, but many stories that link and intertwine the typical cuisine of Friuli Venezia Giulia, where the pleasure of sitting down at the table and discovering the dishes of the territory succeeds in combining the simplicity of tradition with innovation, with genuine ingredients, continuous research and creativity, while respecting the ethical nature and biodiversity of the products. A land that stands out for the variety and vibrancy of its small agricultural and food productions.

The journey of taste continues along six itineraries to discover the food and wine of Friuli Venezia Giulia in the mountains or hills, on the plains, along the coast, the rivers and as far as the Karst, all through unique and authentic experiences.

Friuli Venezia Giulia, a borderland of diverse cultures, influences and contaminations, fully embodies its spirit at the table, in its traditional dishes, capable of expressing a territory in which Central European, Venetian and Slavic cuisines come together.

TRIESTE-jota, fried and breaded sardines, ribaltavapori, Trieste cooked ham with kren horseradish, cheese from the caves (*Jamar*), and Prosciutto from the Karst. You simply cannot miss the Busara-style scampi, the boiled meats in the typical buffets or a stop at an Osmize on the Karst.

**UDINE** - *frico*, *musèt* and PDO *brovade*, gubana, white asparagus, white truffle from Muzzana del Turgnano, Fagagna Pestàt, San Daniele smoked trout, and PDO Prosciutto di San Daniele.

**PORDENONE**: *Pitina* PGI, *Asìno* cheese, Figo Moro from Caneva, potatoes from Ovoledo and Biscotto Pordenone.

The collective trademark of Friuli Venezia Giulia

The "Io Sono Friuli Venezia Giulia" trademark has been created with the aim of highlighting regional agri-food companies and products, with a focus on sustainability, territorial identity and traceability.

The "Company" trademark (gold) identifies and highlights the agri-food companies in Friuli Venezia Giulia that are committed to environmental, economic and social sustainability, and now counts more than 330 participating enterprises.

The "Product" trademark (blue) is placed on the products produced by companies in the Region that have a traceable supply chain, guaranteeing maximum transparency for the final consumer. To date, more than a thousand events have been organised to reinforce the principles of sustainability promoted by the collective trademark.



**GORIZIA**: potato gnocchi with plums seasoned with melted butter, cinnamon, and a little sugar, "in tecia" potatoes, the Rose of Gorizia, and Prosciutto di Cormòns.

At the **SEA**: *Boreto* (a single dish made by quickly cooking the less commercially valuable fish with garlic, vinegar, and black pepper), black cuttlefish, "sievoli sotto sal" (flat head grey mullets preserved in salt for two or three months).

In the **MOUNTAINS**: *cjarsòns* (ravioli with contrasting sweet and savoury fillings), *savôrs* (delicious, chopped vegetables), *toc in braide* (soft polenta, cream of PDO Montasio, olive paste, and smoked ricotta cheese). Also try sot la trape (cheese left to mature in grape pomace), *Gepichta Kropfn*, or the carnival sweet *Mogn Fropfn* from Sappada, Prosciutto di Sauris (delicately smoked), and sour ricotta (*Saurnschotte*).



#### The Wine and Taste Route of Friuli Venezia Giulia

Six souls that become one. Six stories, each one an essential piece of the jigsaw puzzle of flavours of this Region. The Wine and Taste Route of Friuli Venezia Giulia unites six experiences to be enjoyed in territories that are similar and at the same time diverse: "Here in our mountains", "Here in our hills", "Here in our river", "Here in our plain", "Here in our Karst plateau", "Here in our coast". The dedicated website www. tastefyg.it allows you to build a personalised food and wine itinerary. Friuli Venezia Giulia was the first Region in Italy in Italy to enact a law (number 22 of 2015) that creates a network of agri-food, cultural and environmental resources, offering a transversal product for wine tourism, including wineries, farms, restaurants and several other realities in order to provide quality tourist accommodation. It is also known as "Route63" because 1963 is an important date: it marks the birth of the Region of Friuli Venezia Giulia as well as of the "Wine and Cherry Route", which was the first ever Wine Route established in Italy.

# Culture without borders through art and UNESCO sites

Treasures of art and history, along a route that still bears the visible traces of Europe's great past. The legacies of the Celts, the Romans, the Huns, the Turks, the Lombards, the Republic of Venice and the Austro-Hungarian Empire, followed by the dramatic events of the First and Second World War as well as the Cold War, are still clearly visible today in a borderland that has preserved its great history in the cities of Trieste, Udine, Pordenone and Gorizia. Permanent footprints are visible also in the places of art that UNESCO has recognised as World Heritage Sites: Aquileia, Cividale del Friuli, Palmanova and Palù di Livenza, without forgetting the beauty of the Friulian Dolomites, and their natural and cultural background.

#### **Trieste**

Nestled between the white landscape of the Karst and the deep blue of the Adriatic Sea, Trieste is the most international city in the Region, in a dynamic state of evolution and at the same time truly unique for its mixture of languages, cultures and religions, with a Central European matrix fused with a Mediterranean soul. The capital of Friuli Venezia Giulia, it boasts one of the most beautiful squares facing the Adriatic Sea, Piazza Unità d'Italia. In 2021, it was ranked the best city for quality of life in Italy.







The key that unlocks the treasures of art and culture in the Region is the FVGcard, a pass that can be purchased for a period ranging from two days to a week and that includes unlimited access to all the main regional museums and historic-artistic sites, as well as participation in guided tours which are designed and organised by PromoTurismoFVG in the cities of art and the rental of multi-language audio guides, which are also available in a digital format.

#### **Udine**

A cheerful, elegant and friendly city, where the refinement of its architecture meets the rustic charm of its taverns. The capital of the medieval Patria del Friuli, but with strong ties to the Republic of Venice, as evidenced by its palaces and the Venetian influence in the historic centre, it is the treasure chest of the works of Giambattista Tiepolo (1696-1770), the last great painter of the Venetian school: some of his masterpieces can be admired in the Archbishop's Palace, but also in the Cathedral and the Gallery of Ancient Art.

#### Top 5

- The Castle of Udine offers a 360-degree panoramic view of Friuli Venezia Giulia, between plains and mountains
- The Casa Cavazzini Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art, an elegant venue for modern and contemporary exhibitions, the restoration of which was overseen by Gae Aulenti, who was born in Friuli, is home to important works by some of the most significant artists of the 20th century from both the Italian and international scene. Admission is free with the FVGcard
- · The colours and skilful play of perspectives of Giambattista Tiepolo's frescoes in the Diocesan Museum of Udine. Admission is free with the FV-Gcard
- Discover the city by exploring medieval alleyways, and irrigation canals, by shopping and browsing bookshops, as well as by stopping at a tavern to honour the "tajut" ritual: the digital audio guide is also available at the tourist office. Free with the FVGcard
- · Experience "behind the scenes" with the theatrical guided tours at the Teatro Nuovo Giovanni da **Udine theatre**



#### Gorizia

A border city in the heart of Europe, with one foot in Italy and the other in Slovenia, a place that escapes the traditional tourist routes. Until a few years ago, Piazza della Transalpina was the symbol of place on the border, and the wall that crossed it divided the two souls of the city: today it is the topography of memory, an everlasting reminder, but also the symbol of a renewed unity. From the Castle of Gorizia, the view opens up to the gentle hills of Collio, home of worldfamous wines.



#### Go! 2025

Gorizia and Nova Gorica have been jointly nominated as the European Capital of Culture for 2025. Here, visitors can follow in the footsteps of history with guided tours to relive the city's "French" past: it was chosen by the court of Charles X of Bourbon as a place of exile, or to experience the "thrill" of crossing a border once again.

#### **Pordenone**

A young and lively city, but at the same time elegant, with a charming historical centre, Pordenone is a mosaic of 16th-century palaces, Romanesque churches, frescoed façades, as well as Gothic and Baroque buildings. A stroll under the prestigious arcades of the Corso or a visit to the museums and temporary exhibitions is the best way to immerse yourself in local history and culture. The city was the birthplace of the great Renaissance painter Giovanni Antonio de' Sacchis, known as "il Pordenone", whose masterpieces can be seen in St Mark's Cathedral and in the Civic Art Museum, housed in the Ricchieri Palace.

#### Top 5

- In Pordenone, comics are art: the city is home to Paff - the Palace of Arts and Comics in Friuli, a space that promotes comics as an art form that goes beyond communication and thinking.
- Pordenone is at the heart of major international events, including literary festivals (pordenonelegge), as well as film and music events, which over the years have become cult attractions for enthusiasts, transforming the city into a rich and original cultural destination.
- The Ricchieri Palace Art Museum
- Noncello by boat and the murals that can be seen on some of the buildings in the city

#### Pier Paolo Pasolini

Pier Paolo Pasolini, one of the most prominent intellectuals of the 20th century, lived for a long time in his mother's hometown of Casarsa della Delizia, not far from Pordenone. In 2022, the 100th anniversary of his birth was celebrated by dedicating a new itinerary to his memory.



#### II Carso

The Karst, a unique natural and historical territory, is a rocky plateau that stretches along the eastern border of Friuli Venezia Giulia, from Gorizia to Istria, passing through Trieste. Famous for its subterranean landscape of caves and grottos, it is an unmissable destination for nature lovers and slow hikers. But it is also a destination brimming with history and culture, where customs and traditions are the result of the age-old fusion of Latin, Germanic, and especially Slavic cultures. Last but not least, after Trieste, the northernmost part of Istria which includes the Rosandra Valley, and the small port of Muggia and its Venetianstyle town centre. The Cross-border Karst Geopark is currently being developed.

#### Aquileia

Aquileia, an ancient metropolis of the Roman Empire, where you can visit the remains of the forum, the necropolis, private houses with mosaic floors and the imposing structures of the ancient river port. Don't miss the splendid Basilica of Santa Maria Assunta, where you can admire the largest mosaic floor in the Western Christian world, and a visit to the ancient city, the Domus di Tito Macro, and the most important Archaeological Museum in northern Italy. The guided tours and entertainment programmes for children are a must-see (free with the FVGcard or FVGcardAquileia, the single admission ticket to the city).

A UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1998.

#### **Palmanova**

A fortress city framed by a nine-pointed star. Designed and built by the Republic of Venice to defend the regional borders against external threats, it is a masterpiece of military architecture and a model of the ideal Renaissance city. Unique in its kind, it has a central square where its three access roads meet, defended by monumental gates.

A UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2017.

#### Cividale del Friuli

Cividale del Friuli, the capital of the first Lombard duchy, is the starting point of the UNESCO itinerary dedicated to the legacy left to Italy by this mysterious nation. A visit to the city has to include the National Archaeological Museum, the Christian Museum, the extraordinary Lombard Temple, and the mysterious Celtic Hypogeum. Also worth a visit are the suggestive Puppet Museum (Cips) and the De Martiis Family Gallery in Palazzo de Nordis, whose masterpieces span the 20th century in abstract and figurative styles, with some important Impressionist works of art. A UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2011.

#### Palù di Livenza

The pile-dwelling site of which several finds are collected in the Archaeological Museum of Western Friuli in Pordenone. A UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2011.

#### Dolomiti Friulane

The Friulian Dolomites are the westernmost mountain area of Friuli Venezia Giulia and include the Cellina, Tagliamento and Tramontina valleys. Due to the wild nature they still preserve, they are considered the most pristine area of the entire Dolomite mountain range. A UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2009.

- The religious itineraries of Friuli Venezia Giulia: a slow and sustainable experience to rediscover ancient pilgrimage routes and their natural and cultural
- AAT Alpe Adria Trail, the trekking route that links Carinthia, Slovenia, and Friuli Venezia Giulia in 43 stages and stretches from the foot of the Großglockner to Muggia, not far from Trieste, to explore the nature, food, and wine and culture of the Tarvisio, Natisone Valleys, Collio and Carso territories
- The Walk of Peace, the 25-stage route between Slovenia and Friuli Venezia Giulia, which crosses the former Isonzo Front to discover open-air museums, shrines and monuments dedicated to the Great War, starting from Log pod Mangartom and ending in the main square of Trieste, Piazza Unità d'Italia.
- San Daniele del Friuli is home to Biblioteca Guarneriana, the oldest library in Friuli Venezia Giulia, which preserves precious illuminated codices including a 14th-century Divine Comedy and printed books from ancient editions.
- Torviscosa and Panzano are two company towns, urban settlements that have an industrial background. The first is also a founding city because it preserves the architecture of the Italian regime of the 1930s, as well as the urban plan commissioned by the company that built it, which divided the area into functional sections: workplaces, public areas, the workers' village, the homes for executives and employees, as well as leisure facilities. The workers' village of Panzano, a district of Monfalcone, is home to the recently created MuCa, the Shipbuilding Museum.

# Mountain 365 not only skiing

On the peaks between nature, sustainability, and fun. The mountains of Friuli Venezia Giulia offer a variety of choices catering to every individual passion and level of fitness Dedicated ski passes and numerous FVGcard benefits are available to meet the wishes of families or holidaymakers who want to enjoy a day on the snow:

#### The Julian Alps and Pre-Alps, and the Tarvisiano

#### **Tarvisio**

Located at the corner of three borders, Italy, Austria, and Slovenia, Tarvisio is embraced by the Julian Alps and a thousand-year-old forest that, at 24,000 hectares, represents the largest State forest in Italy. A modern town, but with an ancient soul and full of traditions all waiting to be discovered

**SKI** - 24 km of ski areas including the almost 4 km of the Di Prampero slope, the stage for several editions of the Women's Ski World Cup, which opens to breathtaking views; the Arena Paruzzi track, and the slopes of Val Saisera and Pontebba are the paradise of cross-country skiers.

**EXTRA SKI** - dog sledding on the Fusine plain, snowshoeing in the silence of the Bartolo Valley, hiking in the Saisera Valley along the primaeval trail in the millennial forest, the bobsled on rails and the newly renovated children's playground, ice-skating, the bike park and the zipline (open only during the summer season).

- The Venetian Palace of Malborghetto Valbruna and the workshops of the artisans who manufacture sound boxes
- The cuisine of three borders: taste all the Italian, Slovenian, and Austrian culinary influences at Wine and Taste Route venues

### Sella Nevea and the Julian Pre-Alps Park

**SKI** - with slopes ranging from 1,100 to over 2,100 metres above sea level, it is the ideal place for skiing well into the spring. A true natural paradise, it hosts numerous European Cup and FIS events and has a competition centre for fast disciplines. Facing the Slovenian flank of the Julian Alps, Sella Nevea is a particularly attractive resort and the perfect venue, thanks to the high technical profile of its 10.5 kilometres of tracks, for people who love an adrenaline rush and those who enjoy the faster specialities of alpine skiing.

**EXTRA SKI** - snowshoeing in the Julian Pre-Alps Park, climbing majestic walls, and the icefalls in the Raccolana Valley.

- The Museum of the Knife-grinder in the Resia valley
- Ice climbing in the Friulian Dolomites and Julian Alps
- The Julian Prealps Park, a UNESCO MAB Biosphere Reserve



#### **Carnia and the Dolomites**

Inhabited for thousands of years by people who have never lost their traditions and pride, Carnia has preserved a unique and characteristic cultural and religious heritage in its peaks, represented by Roman archaeological remains and typical rural villages, small parish churches and Celtic rites.

#### Ravascletto-Zoncolan

**SKI** - Immersed in the splendid scenery of the Carnic Alps, the Zoncolan is known to all cycling enthusiasts as the "Kaiser", but in winter the golden basin becomes the centre of fun: a skiing area of 24 km with high, sunny slopes reaching almost 2,000 metres, ski mountaineering tracks, a freestyle arena for skiers and snowboarders, and cross-country skiing tracks, including a high-altitude ring, plus a wide range of mountain huts and restaurants for après-ski directly on the slopes.

**EXTRA SKI** - night hiking with lanterns and photography with snowshoes.

#### **Pradibosco**

**SKI** - Surrounded by the peaks of the Pesarine Dolomites and dense forests, it is a village where silence and nature create the perfect atmosphere to take your first steps on skis or immerse yourself in cross-country skiing on 23 km of slopes.

**EXTRA SKI** - fat bike trails and horseback riding in the snow.

#### Be sure not to miss

- The chairlift dedicated to the Giro d'Italia, with chairs autographed by the cycling champions who won a stage of the race
- In Sutrio, the Teno nativity scene and the Vatican nativity scene, which was displayed in the Vatican during the Christmas of 2022
- The thermal baths of Arta Terme
- At the table: cjarsòns (ravioli with a contrasting sweet and savoury filling), Frico with polenta, and Raveo biscuits
- The Open-air Bible in Cercivento, among the mosaics, murals and frescoes on the walls of public and private houses, in the streets and squares.
- The former Coal Mine in Cludinico: 150 kilometres of underground trails in Ovaro
- The Museum of Folk Arts and Traditions of Tolmezzo

#### Forni Avoltri

Forni Avoltri is home to one of the three Italian Fisi biathlon centres: the "Piani di Luzza" Carnia Arena at an altitude of 1,043 metres has specialised facilities for practising the biathlon and, during the summer, part of the track is used for roller skiing.

**EXTRA SKI** - Located at the foot of Mount Coglians, the highest peak in Friuli Venezia Giulia, it is a true paradise for ski mountaineering and snowshoeing enthusiasts.

#### Forni di Sopra

**SKI** - Set against the romantic backdrop of the Dolomites and part of the famous Dolomiti Nordic Ski cross-country circuit, the resort offers 13 kilometres of pistes in the Varmost ski district, where you can ski down challenging slopes - including the longest slope of the Region at 5.5 kilometres, which starts at 2,073 metres above sea level on Mount Crusicalas and descends to the valley floor - as well as tracks for everyone. There are also numerous ski mountaineering routes, some of which lead to mountain dairy farms where typical dishes are served.

**EXTRA SKI** - one of the most family-friendly destinations with the Fantasy Park for the children, a toboggan run and the new ice arena. In summer, there is the Dolomiti Adventure Park and, for the more daring, the Climb Varmost ferrata wall. Here you can climb on ice or participate in themed snowshoe hikes that feature tasting events, biathlon courses, and walks in the Friulian Dolomites Park.

#### Be sure not to miss

- The 15th-century fresco cycles in the Church of San Lorenzo
- The Friulan Dolomites Park, a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2009: considered the most pristine area of the entire Dolomite mountain range

#### **Sauris**

**SKI** - an enchanted alpine village, named Best Tourism Village by the United Nations, with two tracks dedicated to school camps and a blue downhill slope, ideal for beginners starting out on skis, as well as a red and a black slope, the Zheile.

**EXTRA SKI** - excursions on snowshoes or joining an atmospheric carriage ride. People who love to relax can spend their time in the hay baths, saunas and whirlpools of the "Village of Sport and Wellness" Municipal Health Centre.

#### Be sure not to miss

- The Christmas market and Carnival of Sauris
- The zipline overlooking the longest lake in Europe (open only in summer)
- At the table: The name of Sauris is linked to the lightly smoked Prosciutto Crudo, well paired with local beer
- Glamping experiences

#### Sappada

**SKI** - The pearl where the Piave River has its source guarantees fun and excitement for everyone with its 15 km of alpine ski slopes appropriate for beginners as well as more experienced skiers, the 13 km loop with highly technical cross-country skiing sections, and the numerous ski mountaineering trails.

**EXTRA SKI** - from ice-climbing to snow walks along the Piave River, in the woods, or on pristine slopes, from the adventure park's thrill rides to outings on horses or carriages.

#### Be sure not to miss

- A walk through the hamlets of Old Sappada, one of the Most Beautiful Villages of Italy
- The Carnival/Plodar Vosenocht
- · Horse-drawn sleigh rides
- Nevelandia, the largest snow playground in Friuli Venezia Giulia

### Piancavallo and the mountains of Pordenone

**SKI** - 17 km of ski areas with three highlights. A large snow park offers freestylers the chance to challenge themselves with jumps and rails, a border cross track, and a ski cross course for snowboarders and skiers. Crosscountry skiers can also have fun with 15 km of slopes and a 1.5 km illuminated ring trail.

**EXTRA SKI** - The downhill ride on the rail bobsleigh, which plunges from an altitude of 1,500 metres with an average gradient of 15%, is thrilling. You can also experience snowshoeing and, for the little ones, have fun in the Nevelandia playground.

#### Be sure not to miss

- A walk along the shores of Lake Barcis, the Village of Poffabro, and the Vajont Dam
- The Claut ice rink where you can skate or learn to practise curling
- The Friulan Dolomites Park, Listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2009, it is widely recognised as the most pristine area of the Dolomites: surrounded by its own natural park, it is a paradise for people who love trekking, ski mountaineering, Nordic walking, free climbing and ice climbing.

### The itineraries in the footsteps of history

Border and frontier are terms that are often associated with Friuli Venezia Giulia. Nestled in the heart of Europe, but open to the Adriatic, its strategic position has often placed the Region at the centre of major conflicts and important historical transitions, becoming one of the main stages for the events of the 20th century, known as the "The Age of Extremes".

History, here, is travelled one step at a time. History that can be discovered today by visiting the countless traces that the great events have left in Friuli Venezia Giulia, an authentic and vast openair museum, starting with the 25 itineraries dedicated to the Great War. The Isonzo Karst, the Natisone Valleys, the peaks of Carnia and the Tarvisiano region have preserved trenches, fortifications, stations and the remains of barracks of the first line. In the hillside area of the Tagliamento, as far as the Friulian Dolomites, visitors can retrace the tragic events of the retreat of October-November 1917. In Trieste, one of the iconic cities of the history of Italy in the 20th century, and on the Karst plateau, both Austro-Hungarian and Italian memories coexist. Throughout the Region, there is evidence of the Second World War and the Cold War, which left everlasting scars behind.

The "Walk of Peace", a journey between Slovenia and Friuli Venezia Giulia, from Bretto - Log pod Mangartom to Trieste, which was awarded as the best European Interreg project in 2020. From the Alps to the sea in the midst of nature to experience the history, culture, and food and wine of this Region on the border, which was completed in the spring of 2022. There are 25 stages connecting all the main open-air museums, sites, shrines, and monuments of the Great War.

From the Friulian Dolomites, a UNESCO World Natural Heritage Site since 2009, to the Julian and Carnic Alps and Pre-Alps, from the gentle slopes of the Collio to the wild Karst of Trieste and Gorizia, from the Natisone Valleys to the evocative landscapes of the Grado and Marano lagoons: a territory teeming with biodiversity, where sport and nature become one and the same. Two nature parks, three regional reserves, almost forty biotopes and no less than 13 nature reserves for climbing, trekking, mountaineering, paragliding, hanggliding, mountain biking and horse riding.



#### Wild Nature Fishing

Marbled and brown trout, grayling and brook trout swimming in pure, crystal-clear waters. Away from mass tourist destinations, Friuli Venezia Giulia is a true paradise for fly and spinning fishing enthusiasts, with stretches of river and lakes reserved exclusively for catch&release.

For those who want to enjoy the treasures of the Region in complete safety, a professional fishing guide can certainly be an important point of reference. From selecting the best spot to obtaining licences and fishing permits, from specific equipment to the right approach to make your day unforgettable.

#### **Trekking**

For people who love to spend their free time surrounded by nature, Friuli Venezia Giulia offers many opportunities to enjoy this passion in a variety of settings with truly unique natural landscapes.

#### Multiple-day and cross-border itineraries

- The Via Alpina: the yellow trail that starts in Trieste, crosses the Karst, the Carnic Alps, the Julian Alps, and ultimately reaches the Allgäu Alps in Germany
- The Alpe Adria Trail: the trekking route that connects Carinthia, Slovenia and Friuli Venezia Giulia in 43 stages. From the foot of the highest mountain in Austria, the Großglockner, the route crosses the most beautiful lake and mountain regions of Carinthia and Slovenia all the way to the Adriatic Sea in Muggia, near Trieste.
- The Montanevie: a tourist itinerary that winds along the first mountain range of the province of Pordenone, among forests and terraces on which villages and hamlets are built, genuine gems of spontaneous architecture
- The Circuit of the Friulian Dolomites UNESCO World

Heritage Site: 4 stages and 4 mountain huts, a trekking route in the beautiful setting of the Friulan Dolomites Regional Natural Park

- The Alta Via of Forni di Sopra: 5 days of trekking among alpine huts and cheese houses deep in the wilderness of the Forni di Sopra hollow



discover the Region along unique landscapes and itineraries, experiencing nature and rural villages, workshops, secret castles and ancient mills where time seems to have stood still.

#### Villages and traditions to discover

- The 13 Most Beautiful Villages of Italy in Friuli Venezia Giulia: Clauiano, Cordovado, Fagagna, Gradisca d'Isonzo, Palmanova, Poffabro, Polcenigo, Sappada, Sesto al Reghena, Strassoldo, Travesio, Valvasone Arzene and Venzone
- Sacile, the "Garden of the Republic of Venice" is a perfect combination of land and water that is expressed through alleyways, bridges, and noble palaces where you can discover the elegance of Venetian Renaissance architecture
- Villa Manin in Passariano, a Venetian villa in Palladian style, where Napoleon signed the Treaty of Campoformido. Today it is a renowned venue for international exhibitions
- The medieval Castle of Ragogna, home to the Scriptorium Foroiuliense, which is one of the very few amanuensis schools in Italy
- Forni di Sotto, Lauco, Ravascletto, Raveo, and Sauris are the authentic villages of Friuli Venezia Giulia, proud custodians of architecture and traditions with an ancient spirit.
- The Resia Valley, where language, traditions, and folklore have remained unchanged for almost 15 centuries

# From the Alps to the lagoon: pedalling to discover the territory

As many as 1,400 kilometres of cycle routes, more than 800 of which are already accessible, crossing rivers, streams, the countryside and forests, visiting ancient villages and characteristic hamlets, for an all-round tourism experience that embraces sustainability and environmental awareness all year round

Slow itineraries through landscapes and vineyards that are perfect for families and fans of authentic flavours. Climbs and descents through nature on mountain bikes, exciting roads and mountains known from the Giro d'Italia - including the famous Zoncolan - for sports enthusiasts on racing bicycles. Last but not least, in addition to the better-known Alpe Adria Cycle Track, which crosses the entire Region from the mountains to the lagoon, intertwining with history, culture and traditions and which is one of the most award-winning routes in Europe, there are many other exciting itineraries in our territory, which can be travelled 365 days a year.



Friuli Venezia Giulia offers an all-round experience: from racing bikes to gravel bikes, from fat bikes to mountain bikes, from city bikes to trendy bikes, with routes for everyone. It is one of the few Italian Regions which has a Regional Plan for Cycling Mobility (Premoci) that involves 10 cycle routes, five of which have already been mapped out for tourism aimed at sustainability and environmental awareness. Approximately 60 loop circuits branch off from the cycle routes to discover rural villages, cities of art, UNESCO World Heritage sites and untouched nature.

#### A year-round cycling adventure from the Alps to the Adriatic Sea

Multi-day cycling itineraries Indicatively, each stage can be covered in one day

ALPE ADRIA CYCLE TRACK (FVG1) A fascinating cross-border route, linking Salzburg with Grado, which crosses the border of the Alps and reaches the Adriatic Sea. An itinerary that travels through two UNESCO World Heritage sites (Palmanova and Aquileia) and two of the Most Beautiful Villages of Italy (Venzone and Strassoldo). The stages in Italy are: Tarvisio - Venzone - Udine - Grado. Total length: 415 km, of which 175 km are in FVG and 810 metres at the highest altitude in FVG.

THE ADRIATIC CYCLING ROUTE (FVG2) It is part of the European Eurovelo 8 cycle track that starts from Cadiz (Spain) and reaches Athens, with a length of 7,600 kilometres. In Friuli Venezia Giulia it corresponds to a section of the AdriaBike (currently involved in Interreg projects) which starts in Slovenia (Kranjska Gora) and descends to Gorizia and then reaches Trieste before continuing towards Venice with an extension to Padua and Ravenna. The AdriaBike is the end point of the Munich-Venice cycle route and in Friuli Venezia Giulia it connects Lignano Sabbiadoro with Trieste: a route along the coast through a UNESCO World Heritage Site (Aquileia) with the possibility of travelling some sections on boats equipped for transporting bicycles. Le stages are: Venice - Caorle - Lignano Sabbiadoro - Grado - Trieste. Total length from Venice: 260 km of which 136 in FVG.

PEDEMONTANA CYCLING ROUTE (FVG3) The cycle route runs at the foot of the Pre-Alps through villages, towns with typical rural stone architecture and the winegrowing areas that produce the celebrated wines of the Grave, Colli Orientali del Friuli and Collio wine districts. The itinerary features minimal elevation gain and features cycle tracks, easy gravel roads and limited road traffic. The route starts in Sacile, which is connected to the Munich-Venice cycle route via the Meschio River (Sacile-Vittorio Veneto) and ends in Gorizia, which is linked with the AdriaBike. The UNESCO World Heritage site of Cividale del Friuli is also reached. Stages: Sacile – Maniago – Gemona del Friuli – Cividale del Friuli - Gorizia. Total length: 180 kilometres.

**TAGLIAMENTO CYCLING ROUTE (FVG6)** The bicycle itinerary runs along both sides of the Tagliamento River, which is the king of European rivers by virtue of its characteristics. Cycle tourists can admire a great variety

of landscapes, from the Carnic Alps to the morainic hills of San Daniele del Friuli and the Friulian plains, all the way to the sea at Lignano Sabbiadoro. The peculiarity of this cycle route is that it consists of two parallel tracks, separated by the river, that form a large loop to be covered in six days, crossing different territories and returning to your car at the starting point. Stages along the right bank: Tolmezzo-Spilimbergo-San Vito al Tagliamento-Lignano Sabbiadoro. Total length of the route along the right bank: 142 km. Stages along the left bank: Tolmezzo-San Daniele del Friuli-Codroipo-Lignano Sabbiadoro. Total length of the route along the left bank: 146 km.

From Tolmezzo it is possible to cycle along the But and Degano Rivers, two tributaries of the Tagliamento River, following the two cycle routes that make up the short Carnia Cycle Route (FVG8), passing through archaeological sites and the Carnic Alps Geopark.

#### **FAMILY**

In Friuli Venezia Giulia you can cycle with your family in complete safety. Below is a selection of protected cycling routes suitable for children from 10 years of age accompanied by their parents.

- The Grado Cycling Circuit (approx. 11 km)
- The Saisera Valley Cycling Circuit (approx. 19 km)
- The Rogge Cycling Circuit (approx. 36 km)
- The Trieste Draga Sant'Elia Route and return (approx. 21 km)
- The Maniago Cavasso Nuovo Route and return (approx. 15 km)
- The Tolmezzo Zuglio Arta Terme Route and return (approx. 19 km)

There is also an off-road cycling school in Friuli Venezia Giulia at Monte Prat (Forgaria nel Friuli), which is close to the town of San Daniele del Friuli, for children from the age of 6, directed by a former national champion.





#### Mountain bike

Experiencing nature on a mountain bike is an intense activity with climbs, descents, dirt roads and endless surprises and challenges at every bend.

- The Made-bike a route along the Alpine arc (Julian and Carnic Alps) to the Austrian border
- The "4valli trail" routes in the Carnic Alps
- The Natisone and del Torre Valleys gravity itineraries

#### Food&Wine

The bicycle tracks and loop circuits cross territories that are rich in wine and agri-food resources. This is a selection of cycling loop itineraries for a unique food and wine experience.

- The Collio-Brda Circuit a cross-border route through the vineyards of Collio and Brda
- The Ribolla Gialla di Rosazzo Circuit a route through the vineyards of the DOC Colli Orientali del Friuli wine district
- The San Daniele Circuit a route dedicated to Prosciutto Crudo
- The Montasio Circuit a route to discover the place where Montasio cheese was born.

#### **Sporting cycle-tourism**

For people who love racing bike challenges, Friuli Venezia Giulia is the Region that presents incredible opportunities to put themselves to the test by tackling the climbs of the following stages of the Giro d'Italia:

- The ascent of Mount Zoncolan from Sutrio or Ovaro in the Carnic Alps
- Mount Ragogna near San Daniele del Friuli
- The ascents of the Montasio plateau and Mount Lussari in the Julian Alps
- Aviano Piancavallo
- Cividale Castelmonte





#### Intermodal transport

Friuli Venezia Giulia is a Region that provides cyclists and sportspeople with the opportunity to travel by public transport with their bicycles. Throughout the year, regional Trenitalia trains reserve seats for bike transport, just like the Udine - Cividale train service and the MiCoTra, the train that connects Udine to Villach, in Austria, twice a day, and on Saturdays and Sundays also Trieste - Villach (both services are

managed by the operator Ferrovie Udine - Cividale). In the summer season the offer is expanded with the activation of the BICIBUS and BICI+BOAT services, which connect the seaside resorts of Grado and Lignano Sabbiadoro to Trieste, Aquileia, Muggia, and Marano Lagunare. Lignano is linked to Bibione by the boat crossing on the Tagliamento River.

# Sea, wind harmony and passion

Over 25 marinas, numerous shipyards and sailing clubs, totalling more than 15,000 berths, spread across 130 kilometres of coastline.

Friuli Venezia Giulia is the ideal starting point for all types of vessels and it provides top-class services, with moorings that are also equipped for mega-yachts, shore entertainment and all types of amenities, including specialised shipyards and a network of companies and skilled professionals devoted to the sector.

The range of boating services is diversified between marina resorts with wellness facilities, swimming pools, restaurants, dry marinas, floating mobile homes, and house boats located in a variety of natural settings.

Throughout the year, the Region hosts more than 100 high-profile nautical events, the most important of which is the Barcolana: on the second Sunday in October, the Gulf of Trieste becomes the scene of the largest regatta in the world, a magical mix of competitive racing and "pop" party that transforms Trieste into the sailing capital of Europe.

A spectacle that floods the Gulf with boats of all sizes, from the most technologically advanced hulls to the smallest sails, a feast of sea and land that brings dates and events to the capital of Friuli Venezia Giulia for ten days (www.barcolana.it).
